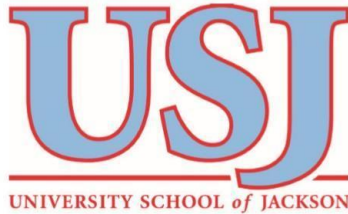

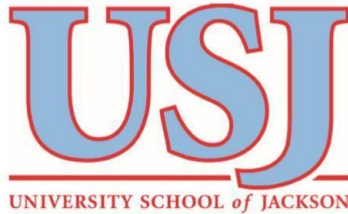

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Student Responsibility

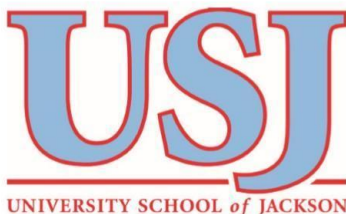
Middle School is an integral time for students to grow and practice habits that will set them up to be successful in Upper School, college, and career. Middle School students are expected to accept and practice responsibilities as they embark on a new academic, social, and emotional journey. In addition to reporting to class on time and managing a 7 class-period rotating schedule, students should email or speak with teachers when questions arise, schedule and attend tutorials, check their grades regularly, and keep up with coursework, among other responsibilities. Responsibility, however, is a practiced skill, and our teachers, counselor, and administrators are here to help guide your children as they learn how to organize coursework, manage time, practice responsibility, and accomplish challenging tasks. In addition to help from school faculty, the Middle School offers homework and test Google calendars that allow parents and students to review assignments and prepare for assessments as needed. Assignments are also posted in Google Classroom.

Middle School Information and Grades

To find important Middle school information and to check student grades, parents and students are urged to visit My School App's Middle School Resource Board. Here, you will find information such as the tutorial schedule, calendar highlights, the Middle School handbook, links, and schedules. To access the Resource Board, log into www.usjbruins.myschoolapp.com, click on "resources", and click "Middle School Resource Board." To check grades, log into My School App, and click on your child's name. When you scroll down, you will see courses listed. Change the term, and click on the correct quarter. Grades will then appear. Under each grade, you may click "see grade detail" for more information.

Monitoring Student Accounts

Our faculty and students use technology at all grade levels to enhance learning, and Google Classroom, as well as web-based resources, is integrated into the learning environment. With such tools comes an increase in student and parent responsibility to monitor student accounts. School accounts include Google Classroom (assignments), Blackbaud/My School App (grades/attendance), and Gmail (email). We recommend that parents monitor any personal chat features and messaging tools, as well as student web history. All students and parents sign an acceptable use policy at the beginning of the school year. 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Homework and Test Calendars

Homework and Test Calendar links will be sent out via email close to the start of the year. We encourage parents and students to view these calendars regularly. Calendar links are also available on the Middle School Resource Board.

Academics

Students are offered a variety of challenging academic courses designed to prepare them for High school and beyond. Each sixth grader is enrolled in English, Math 6 or Honors Math 6, History, and Earth Science. Each of these courses requires a comprehensive final exam in December and May, which counts as 1/7 of the student's average for the semester. In addition to these courses, sixth grade students take a variety of extracurricular classes, including Art, STEM, Intro to Literature and Writing, Strength and Conditioning, and Physical Education. Students may choose to take band or music. The daily schedule offers tutorial time from 3:05-3:35, and students are encouraged to schedule tutorials with a teacher or attend the weekly structured tutorial.

Absences

USJ recognizes that education requires continual instruction, classroom participation, learning experiences, and diligent study for students to reach their maximum potential. Tardiness and absenteeism are detrimental to academic achievement. Research has shown that there is a direct relationship between attendance and scholastic performance. Students with satisfactory attendance records have a better chance to achieve higher grades, enjoy school, and learn the responsibility necessary for independence and success in later life.

A parent *must* notify the Middle School Assistant, Hayley Wilkerson (731-660-2110 or hwilkerson@usjbruins.org) between 7:45 a.m. and 8:30 a.m. on any day that a student is to be absent from school, will check out for an appointment, or will check in late. Pre-arranged absences must be given to the Middle School office one calendar week prior to the absence date. In the case of a pre-arranged absence, it is necessary whenever possible that the student complete assessments and/or previously-assigned coursework prior to the date of the absence. *The student should request all assignments from teachers and make arrangements to make up any missed tests or quizzes.* Students check themselves in and out through the Middle School office. Please see the Middle School Handbook located on the MS Resource Board for full information.

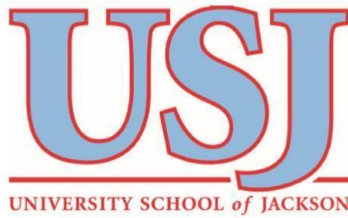

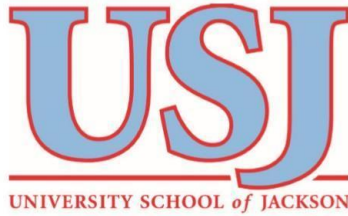
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Musical Productions

The Middle School musical productions are a fun way to help prepare the students for the larger productions in the Upper School. Students get the opportunity to perform on the Blankenship Theater stage up to four times a year. Typically, there are one to two middle school productions, and sometimes the upper school musicals, and even plays, will open auditions up to the middle school students. This is a great way to showcase your talents. Even if you are not a strong singer, but a great actor or dancer, there are plenty of ways to get involved. Students who are leaning more towards the technical side will also find the musicals to be a lot of fun and educational.

Every musical and play will hold auditions in the theater. For the musicals, students will get up as a group and sing one of the hit songs from the show. Once they are familiar, they will sing individually so the directors can see what part will best suit them. Upon completing the vocal audition, they will be asked to get up on stage and read a specific scene from the show with other students. There are usually two days of auditions, with call backs on the third day if needed. Rehearsals typically start the following week and will be held first thing in the morning before school starts, after school, or in the evening. Some Saturday rehearsals will be required, and every show has mandatory rehearsals that students must attend. There is something for everyone in USJ theater!





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Band

Step 1 - Talk with your student about band, and have him or her enroll in 6th Grade Beginning Band during Middle School Course Selection in March. Contact me with any questions.

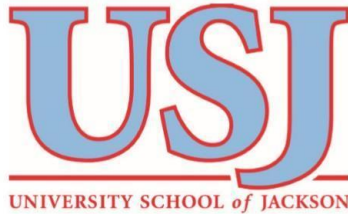
Step 2 - During the first week of school we will have "hands on" time to select the instrument your child will play. Don't worry if they don't know what they want to play. We'll find it.

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Advisory



Advisory is an integral part of life in the Middle School. Much like in Character Ed in Lower School, the purpose of Advisory is to begin to understand and master social-emotional skills, such as emotion management, impulse control, problem solving, and empathy. Each Middle School student is assigned a faculty advisor from his or her grade level who becomes a mentor throughout the school year. The advisor can be extremely helpful to Middle School students as they become acclimated to their new Middle School environment. For each year of middle school, advisory groups provide an opportunity, outside of the academic environment, to build relationships among students and teachers. Advisory groups meet every Thursday and have a specific, research-based curriculum for social-emotional learning, called *Second Step*. The topics are built around the skills necessary to thrive in and out of the classroom, such as making good decisions, developing a growth mindset, dealing with conflict, and being a confident learner. Interest Groups

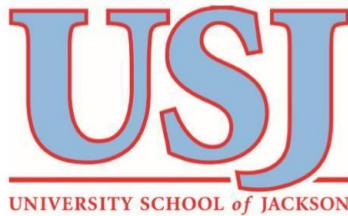
At the start of the school year, students may sign up for interest groups with their A period teachers. Interest groups meet at varying times throughout the school year, and students are responsible for organizing their interest group schedules. School-wide schedules will also be posted on the MS resource board.

USJ Study Group

USJ Study Group is a student-led peer-to-peer mentoring and tutorial program that pairs Upper school students with Middle school students in an effort not only to provide academic and organizational tutoring, but also to help bridge the gap between Middle and Upper schools. Students are recommended to the study group by their teachers, though interested students are urged to reach out to their teachers for more information.

Student Council

Student Council gives students opportunities for leadership and service to the school community. The Student Council is led by students who are elected in the fall by their homerooms to serve a one-year term. The representatives are divided into a Spirit Committee and a Community Service Committee to help organize events and activities for the Middle School. Students' suggestions will be brought to the Student Council for consideration by representatives of each homeroom. Student Council members will also help in hosting prospective students on their visits to the school. Student Council is a wonderful opportunity for student involvement and leadership.



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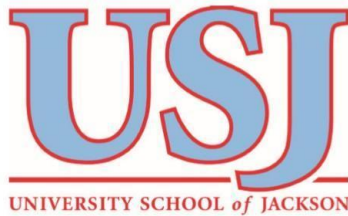
Community Service

The Middle School faculty believes it is important for our students to connect to their community- learning what the problems are, who is working to solve those problems, and how they can positively impact our community.

Our student council officers and leaders attend a leadership workshop in the fall. During the workshop, students breakout into small groups with other students from various school backgrounds. In the breakout sessions, the students learn how to be better leaders, gather new ideas for fundraisers and community service projects, and they learn how to be a more productive student council member for their school. Our student council leaders and sponsors are instrumental in organizing the Middle School community service projects described below:

- RIFA Backpack Program or Canned Food Drive- Each year our Middle School students participate in RIFA's Backpack program or Canned Food Drive. We collect needed items for RIFA.
- Hands Up Preschool- The student council goes to Hands Up Preschool each year. During their visit, they do activities with the kids (read, paint, etc.), help complete tasks that need to be done (paint furniture/etc., serve and prepare the food, clean up the playground, etc.) and play games with the kids.
- Ronald McDonald House- We will collect pop tabs as part of their Pop Tab Palooza and raise money to give as a donation.
- March of Dimes- The Middle School students compete in "quarter wars" each year to see which grade will bring the most quarters. All money is donated to March of Dimes.
- Salvation Army Angel Tree – Middle School classes adopt an Angel Tree child and collect gifts for Christmas.





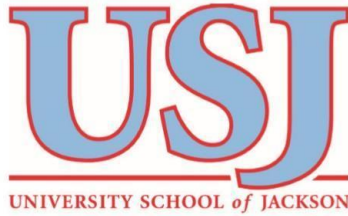
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Bring Your Own Device Policy

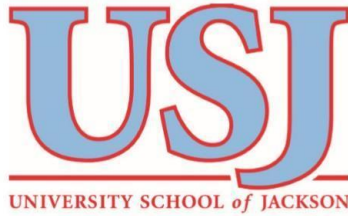

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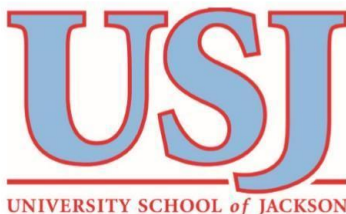

Middle School Course Descriptions

Grades 6-8

English

Sixth Grade English: This course focuses on the writing process, reading comprehension, spelling and vocabulary development, and refinement of grammar skills. Students learn how to demonstrate knowledge of a topic using self-expression through technology both within groups and/or individually. The course introduces the writing process for expository, narrative, and argumentative topics.

Seventh Grade English: This course emphasizes grammar, vocabulary, literature, and composition, particularly grammar usage and its incorporation into written composition. There is continued use of novel reading and discussion skills, and the research paper is introduced in this course.

Seventh Grade English - Honors: This course stresses grammar, vocabulary, and composition, along with the introduction of the forms and terms of literature. The novel, the short story, drama, and poetry constitute the literary genres. The course includes research and creative writing projects.

Eighth Grade English: This course focuses on grammar, vocabulary, literature, and composition studies with a continued emphasis on grammar mastery and research skills. Study skills that will be needed in the Upper School are introduced in this course.

Eighth Grade English - Honors: This course focuses on grammar, vocabulary, literature, and composition studies with a continued emphasis on grammar mastery and research skills. Study skills that will be needed in the Upper School are introduced. A special emphasis on SAT vocabulary is stressed.

Social Studies

Sixth Grade Geography and Tennessee History: The first semester, students will develop an understanding of Tennessee history, from its frontier days to when it became the 16th state in the Union. During second semester,



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students study World Culture and Geography to develop an understanding of how different cultures developed. This is done through a study of the seven continents, which also improves knowledge of geography.

Seventh Grade Ancient World History: This study of history and geography examines social, cultural, and technological changes beginning with prehistoric times. A major focus of this course is the development and advancement of ancient civilizations.

Eighth Grade United States History: This is a complete study of the United States from the discovery of America to Reconstruction. Geography and map skills are included.

Mathematics

Sixth Grade Mathematics: This course emphasizes mastery in fundamental skills of mathematics. Content material is explored through reasoning, problem solving, number relationships and theory, patterns and functions, and pre-algebraic concepts.

Sixth Grade Mathematics - Honors: This course transitions students from arithmetic to algebra. The course builds foundational skills using basic operations with integers, the use of variables, solving equations and inequalities, problem solving skills, relations and functions and polynomials. Students become familiar with the concept of the numerical expressions, algebraic expressions, and equations.

Students selected for Honors Math are required to meet three of four prerequisites: year math average of 95+, above average stanine math score on the Aspire Test, teacher recommendation, and 95+ score on mid-year 5th grade math exam. The teacher recommendation is based on the student's work ethic and math aptitude.

Seventh Grade Mathematics: This course allows students to review and improve arithmetic skills with focus on decimal, fractions, and percentages. There is a continued emphasis on pre-algebra skills integrated with informal geometry.

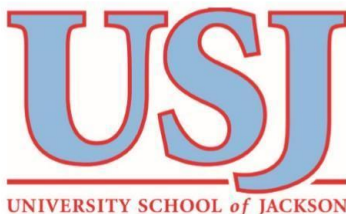
Seventh Grade Mathematics - Honors: This course covers pre-algebra concepts in greater depth. Students will synthesize and algebraically represent situations to solve problems, especially those involving linear relationships.

Eighth Grade Mathematics: In this course, students complete pre-algebra material while introducing fundamental processes of algebra needed for Upper School Mathematics.

Eighth Grade Mathematics - Honors: The sequence of this course involves the application of abstract concepts from previously learned concrete concepts. Students will apply algebraic representations to real world situations and analyze the nature of changes in linear and non-linear relationships.

Science

Sixth Grade Earth Science: This course outlines our current understanding of the Earth's systems as well as our place in the Universe. Generally, three areas are addressed: the structure of the earth, which includes the four spheres; the earth's history; and the earth as part of the solar system. Varied teaching strategies are used to make this a fun and informative study.



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Seventh Grade Life Science: This course introduces students to the complexity of life from the cellular level to a complete, living organism. Students learn life's structures and functions in bacteria, plants, and animals, as well as heredity and the different organ systems of the human body. Lab experiences enrich

the curriculum through hands-on experience and direct observation. This overview of life creates an interest in the world around us as we discuss similarities and differences throughout creation.

Eighth Grade Physical Science: This course provides a study of the basics of chemistry and physics, probes the interaction of matter and energy, and endeavors to give the student an appreciation and understanding of the physical world. Laboratory experiences enhance the learning of principles.

World Language

French/Spanish (Seventh and Eighth Grades): Language courses introduce students to the languages and cultures of French and Spanish-speaking regions. These courses encourage a desire to continue foreign language studies in the Upper School. Students can choose one of the two languages to begin to develop listening, speaking, reading, and writing skills with an emphasis on vocabulary and cultural awareness.

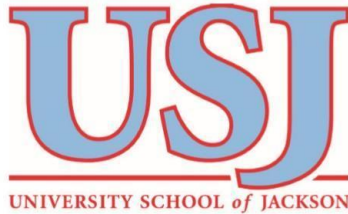
Enrichment Classes

Art: Art classes introduce students to the basic elements of design and how to apply them to fundamental drawing, painting, printing, sculpture, ceramics, and miscellaneous crafts. Also included is a survey of art appreciation used for studying both contemporary and historical art.

Band: The USJ band program is designed to expose students to advanced-level music skills. The purpose of the course is to foster and develop goal setting, time management, rehearsal etiquette, performance practices, and personal and group responsibility, and to instill a desire for life-long learning. Students may choose concert band, athletic band, guitar ensemble, percussion ensemble, woodwind ensemble, brass ensemble, and/or jazz ensemble as well as musical orchestra.

STEM Lab: For the 2021-2022 school year, we are excited to be implementing a STEM Lab as part of our Middle School Enrichment Rotation of classes. STEM is an acronym that stands for Science, Technology, Engineering and Math. While the primary focus of this course will be on the Technology and Engineering elements of STEM, Science and Math will undoubtedly play an integral role as well.

- Sixth Grade - In this Introductory STEM course, we will integrate essential academic skills, such as keyboarding, research methods and Google app mastery, in the implementation of the Coding and Robotics STEM curriculum. Through this curriculum, Students will learn the basics of block coding as well as lego robot assembly and manipulation using their newly acquired coding knowledge.
- Seventh Grade & Eighth grade - As students move through the next two years of the STEM rotation, they will spiral through an increasingly challenging Coding and Robotics curriculum. In addition, students will be introduced to the Engineering Design Process and be given opportunities to work within that process, from product need recognition and planning through creation and marketing.



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Introduction to Foreign Language: This class introduces sixth grade students to Spanish and French culture, history, and vocabulary. They increase listening and speaking skills through class participation.

Literature and Writing: This course focuses on researching one text in order to deepen comprehension of another text. Through both individual and collaborative opportunities, students will demonstrate their application of the text to real-world situations through writing workshops.

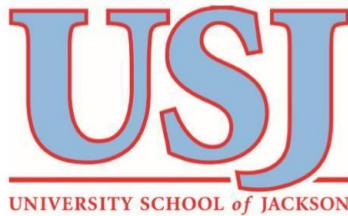
Music (6-8): The music program exposes students to basic music skills with emphasis on music elements such as music theory, music and rhythmic composition, and music history, including the study of musical styles. Eighth grade music students are taught to play the ukulele as a pre-band instrument.

Choir (7-8): The middle school choral program utilizes the learning of vocal production skills and technical performance skills while utilizing varied vocal repertoire. Students are expected to audition for the Tennessee Northwest Jr High Honor Choir.

Physical Education/Strength and Conditioning: This is an organized program of exercise, instruction, and participation as Middle School students develop physically, mentally, socially, and emotionally in a co-educational environment. The student will develop an understanding of personal fitness, along with learning the rules and skills of many team sports.

Co-Curricular Programs

The Middle School provides unique and exciting opportunities for students including assemblies; student advisories and character education classes; interest groups; Student Council; Spelling Bee; MS Science Bowl; athletics; drama productions; academic awards and Eighth Grade celebration; Tennessee Math Contest; National French Contest; Eighth Grade study tour; Seventh Grade study tour; Sixth Grade day excursion; and field trips related to subject areas, such as Quebec trip for French.



Life in the Middle School: A Rising 6th Grade Informational Packet

Middle School Orientation

In an effort to provide the sixth graders with the opportunity to become acquainted with the Middle School building in a less-crowded environment, the 6th grade orientation has been scheduled at a separate time from the 7th and 8th grade orientation.
